Faulty or Aging Breakers: Breakers lose sensitivity over time, tripping even under normal loads. Typical lifespan ranges from 25-40 years. Worn-out breakers at the terminal may require replacement to restore reliable operation .

- Visual Inspection: Check terminals for loose connections, burnt marks, or corrosion. Tighten screws and ensure proper wire seating .
- Load Calculation: Measure the total current on each circuit to ensure it does not exceed the breaker's rating .
