Typically, each switch optical port supports one fiber optic connection per channel, meaning one fiber strand per port, though multi-strand cables or multiple ports can be used for additional connections.

Single-Port Fiber Connections

Each optical port on a network switch, such as an SFP or SFP+ port, is designed to handle one fiber connection per channel. This means a single port can transmit and receive data over one fiber strand (or a pair of fibers for duplex communication) at a time . The type of fiber—single-mode or multi-mode—affects distance and bandwidth but does not change the one-fiber-per-port limitation .

Using Multi-Strand Fiber Cables

To connect multiple switches or devices, multi-strand fiber cables can be used. For example, a 4-strand pre-terminated fiber cable contains four individual fibers, each capable of connecting to a separate port on a switch . This allows multiple connections between switches without requiring additional cable runs, but each fiber still occupies a dedicated port on the switch.
