The color of the jacket on fiber optic cable identifies what type of fiber is used in the jacket. This is specified in TIA 598-C. Single-mode fiber cables made by Schäfter+Kirchhoff are either supplied with a Ø 900 µm buffer and Ø 3 mm jacket with Kevlar strain-relief or with a Ø 900 µm buffer only.
